MAIN TOURNAMENT

Monday

In round 6 on Monday August 1st, undefeated leader Kim Young-sam defeated Dusan Mitic. He is followed at 5-1 by only three. Ondrej won against his countryman Jan Simara. Ilya defeated Christian, while Catalin overcame the opposition of Jeon. Of these three, only Ilya didn't play Kim yet. Next are 14 players in the top group with 4-2 score. We asked Catalin about his game. "It was very close. I won by half a point." See the game record, hopefully elsewhere in this issue.

The MacMahon pairing system is very tough, especially for people who did well in first week, matching them with ever stronger rated opponents. Hence only a few managed to keep their unbeaten records.

Comparing tables at the end of the first week and the start of the second, we noticed that as much as 180 participants left the main tournament. However, the total number of participant rose still a lot – to 758, as many people joined only for the second week.

Tuesday

Indeed Ilya got paired with Kim on Tuesday and also he was unable to stop the leader. Catalin beat Ondrej and became the only one at one loss behind unbeaten Kim. Seven other Europeans plus Jeon follow with two losses in the top-group. In order of SOS: Ondrej, Ilya, Dusan, Jeon and Thomas, Cornel and Alexander, and Dmitriy Surin, the only 5d in this company of strong men. Artem leads the next peloton at 4-3, ahead of Christian, Jan, Csaba, Pal and several more.

German Youth Champion Lukas Kramer, Jesse Savo (Fin) and Benjamin Dréan-Guenaizia (F) are the 4-dans at 5-2. And Andreas Goetzfeld (Lit), Jonas Welticke (D) and Bernd Lewerenz (D) are 3-dans with the same result.

Shodans Damian Popote (F) and Arto Heikkinen (Fin) are doing even better at 6-1 each. Osmin Lacombe 1k is still undefeated, winning against a 4d in the 7th round for 7-0. Also Pierre-Yves Christman won all his games, but missed 1st round: 6-0.

César Lextrait, Charles Guille-Esouret (both 2k, F) and Mark-Matthias Zymia 3k (D) have 6-1 also.

Like Nicolas Puyaubreau, Clément Billoire and Frédéric Vieira (all 4k, F) and Fabien Masson Timothée Huème, Eric le Morvan and Philippe Richard (all 5k, F), Mykhailo Doroskuk 7k (Ukr) and Nicole Tagnon 9k (F).

Among two-digit kyus, four players are still undefeated. Niels Robin-Aubertin 10k beat two 5k's in last rounds. Joris Dugueperoux 14k defeated an 11k and a 10k. Lydia Buntrock 20k won against 17k and 15k. Also Vincent Rigitano 13k didn't lose a game yet, but he missed 1st round: 6-0.

Aurore Bivas 14k and Cyriaque Hauguel 17k are doing fine at 6-1 each.






KNOCK-OUT FINALS

To the surprise of many, including your editor, who also didn't read the small print of new European Championships rules, the European title will be contested in a knock-out phase between the top eight European players in the rankings after seven rounds.

Geert Groenen explained us how the system worked. First a list of the best sixteen European in the rankings after seven rounds is compiled. For the next step the MacMahon score is decisive. Players with the same score play a qualifying game on Wednesday, pairing number 1 with 16, etc..

This year only one relegation match is necessary, between numbers 8, Cornel and 9, Dmitry Surin.

Apparently rules-expert Robert Jasiek conducted a look-back into the results after seven rounds in the last few years. Often several play-offs would be needed on the free day to decide the final eight.

The eight European top-players are ranked as in the main. With number one meeting number eight, two plays seven, etc. Losers of the knock-out drop back into the main tournament, where the Open European Title is contested. An exception is when players already met in an earlier round of the main, like in our case Ilya and Alexander.

The quarter-final pairing are:

Catalin Taranu 5P vs winner of the relegation game Cornel Burzo 6d vs Dmitry Surin 5d Ondrej Silt 6d vs Artem Kachanovskyi 7d Ilya Shiksin 7d vs Thomas Debarre 6d Dusin Mitic 6d vs Alexander Dinerchtein 3P

Geert noticed that young players are doing well, as only Alexander and Catalin are over 30, the others are quite a bit younger. About his own performance, lowest on SOS with his 5-2 as a 5d, he remarked: "Quite likely, that I'll be paired up next round and meet one of the strong Koreans!"

Fate decided differently. On a bicycle outing around some lakes, Laima – Geert's girlfriend had an unfortunate accident. Hence, he withdrew from the 8th round. We wish her a healthy fast recovery (Last news: Luckily, she already left hospital and is back at her hotel here).



After the quarter-finals, we met Ilya and asked him for his experience.

- Did you know, that knock-out finals were up?
- "Not really. I found out here. But it happened before".
- Yes, I remember semi-final knock-outs, both in EGC-1987 in Grenoble and also Hamburg 1988.

How was your game?

- "I had a good game. I think I was leading from the beginning"
- So you had black?
- "No, I was white!"
- Strange thing to say with white: leading from the start ...
- "Why? White gets komi!"

He couldn't tell us anything about the other games, except the results: all favourites won. Catalin beat Cornel, Artem defeated Ondrej and Alex won with Dusan. All on white. The 7-dans are in each others cosy company for the semi-finals on last Friday.

In the semi-finals both Catalin and Ilya got black and won. Catalin defeated Alexandr and Ilya won with Artem. The finalists won the European title before, but both on SOS or even SODOS. We are sure that taking the title of European Champion in a knock-out final is much more rewarding!

MAIN TOURNAMENT, NUMBERS OF VICTORY

Meanwhile, in the top of the main tournament nothing much spectacular happened. Kim continued to win, like most ranking favourites. A small exception was the win of Rémi Campagnie 5d over Antti Tormanen 6d. Benjamin Teuber 6d was satisfied with his win against Nicola Mitic 5d.

Further down the rankings, Nicole Tagnon 9k lost to someone nominally 5 stones stronger, but Niels Robertin-Aubertin 10k kept on winning. Now he defeated a 4k!

On Friday Kim Young-sam won one more. No-one can keep him from winning the Open European Championship. Probably he'll take it with a clean 10-0 record, and several wins ahead of the next one, which hasn't happened since the EGC in St; Petersburg, where Hong Seul-ki won very clearly. Jeon Sang Youn is likely to take second place, as he is the only one in the top-group with 7-2 score. Ondrej leads the group with 6-3 on SOS. Next are Thomas, Artem and Dusan with equal SOS. Cornel and Alexander are 2 SOS points behind the trio. Christian, Dmitry and Pal won six games as well.

Only among kyu-players there are still a lot, who won seven or more, starting with Hermann Woehrel 1k (D) and many French participants. Emmanuelle Conan 12k would have liked to be among them, but she needed to withdraw from 9th round with her 6-2 score. Stanislav Bohm 6k (CZ) missed 1st round. He still won seven games. Likewise Vincent Rigitano 13k, but he even won all his eight games so far! Bravo and for sure prizes on Saturday.

Also those with a 8-1 score will make the podium: Matthias-Mark Zymia 3k (D), Timothée Huème, Emmanuel Pinglier and Fabien Masson (all 5k), Ivan Suarez 8k (all F) and Lydia Buntrock 20k (D).

SIDE EVENT



RENGO

The Rengo tournament ended Tuesday evening with the semi-finals and the final. At the start, 46 teams of 3 had played 3 rounds in eight groups. Group winners moved to the quarter-final knock-outs. Only Ailin team qualified with two wins and best SOS, all other won three.

In the semi-finals Ailin team lost to Kim's and Mezhov's beat Lisy's.

In the finals, Kim's team took the title, while Lisy's won bronze.

TEAM TOURNAMENT

Sixteen teams played three qualification rounds. Despite there name, The Losers (Suzanne Vernimmen 1k, Fleuss 5k, Finkelnberg 5k and Jordan 10k) did well with four won games. Still, they had chosen their name correctly, as they ended up leading the lower half of the table at ninth place.

Skillfully skilled (Jan Simara 5d, Pavol Lisy 5d, Rémi Compagnie 5d and Ondrej Kruml 4d) ranked third in strength, but lost surprisingly in the first round to All Stars (Michaeli Tal 2d and three 2k's) and in the second to Kim c.s. A win in last round came to late. Swiss team took a firm grip on the red lantern. They had as much holes in their defence as in a good piece of Emmental cheese. They lost all their games.

Part of the fun of the team tourney is choosing the names. No idea, what Pichones mean in Spanish. Ice Tea Team is evident as The stupid ice cream. Flying hedgehogs are very rare in nature, but not in Go. The Sandbaggers and I'm so sorry team says it all. Les gentils rations laveurs, are they really gentle washing rats?

The best eight moved up to the quarter-finals, where the differences in strengths came out clearly. Of the losing teams only Mickey's (Dréan Goenaizia 4d, Le Calve 4d, Montaron 3d en Retiere 1d) won a game against San Guo Sha (Yanqi Zhang 6d, Xu Zhou 5d, Yue Li, 5d and Koller 2k).



Lille's power (Danel 3d, Friscourt 2d, Rey 2d and Ginisty 4k) lost all games to Kim bab myeong ga. Les gentils ratons laveurs (Blanchard 3d, Ambroise 2k, Pinglier 5k and Fichaux 6k) lost to Equipe Staff. Narumi team (Oikawa 3d, Doganey 3d, Kikuchi 2d and Nicolas 2k) to Motokis Mercenaries.

San Guo Sha ousted favourites Kim's team (Kim Youngsam 7d, Jeon Sang-youn 7d, Javier Aleksi Savolainen 5d and Vanessa Wong 4d) in one semi-final.

Motokis Mercenaries are the young warriors Dusan Mitic 6d, Ali Jabarin 6d, Fredrik Blomback 6d and Nicola Mitic 5d. Ironically Motoki is also part of the Staff, but not of their team: Benjamin Papazogliu 5d, Toru Imamura 3d, Vincent Mugnier 1d and Weejhesam 1d). The young warriors won a place in the final, which they lost to the girl power of San Guo Sha!

9X9 CHAMPIONSHIP

On Thursday 48 people filled eight groups of six to qualify for the knock-outs on Friday.

Christina Amhof 1d won all her five games in A group, Dmitry Surin 5d only lost to her. In B group Robert Jasiek 5d defeated Vivien Desveaux 3d. Both qualified with a 4-1 score. In C group Joris Dugueroux 14k won against Jonas Wetticke 3d. Both won four games. Group D was a very close race. Ambroise Recapt-Conor 2k qualified with four wins. Three ended with a 3-2 result. SOS and the win over Dani Damaz 6k brought Amir Fragman 4d further.

Alexandru Nae 2k and Amandine Lacues 6k ended on top of E group with four points each. Stéphane Melcer 4k won all games in F group and Antonio Egea 3d had won with Alessandro Pace.

Thibault Gautier 2d won all five in G group, where Andreas Goetzfield 3d lost only to him. Veteran Viktor Bogdanov 3d won group H, while Benjamin Gigot 2d also won four games.

RAPID TOURNAMENT

Tournament Director Emeric Salmon runs the rapid tournament separately from other events on his own lap-top. So results are not on-line. On Thursday he presented the leaders in the highest MacMahon group. It seems Antti Tormanen is set to win. He won all seven rounds. Frederic Blomback only lost Antti, but stopped to participate after 4 rounds. Cornel Burzo and Jeon Sang Youn both won 5 from 7 games and are also likely to land on the podium on Saturday during the prize giving ceremonies.

ANECDOTES FROM PAST CONGRESSES

1 - THE PREZ

2 – CHAMPIONSHIP OF WEST-EURASIA

Once upon a time, not so long ago ... there was a tournament for the title of a West-EurAsia. According to habits of local Championships in West-EurAsia, if the tournaments best would share number of wins, Sum of Opponents Scores (SOS), and even Sum Of Defeated Opponents Scores (SODOS), the mutual game - if any - would decide who would be declared to be the winner of that weekend tournament ... But not so at the official Championship of

West-EurAsia. The mutual game does not matter for the final result, according to the rule book of West-EurAsian Go-Baduk Federation.

Once upon a time two East-Asians won the tournament.

One lost to the other, who had lost to someone else.

But that didn't matter.

By chance they had even the same SODOS. So two winners.

Some West-EurAsian Prez decided otherwise.

So one East-Asian was declared Champ and the other won Silver.


















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
